Every high priest chosen from among mortals is put in charge of things pertaining to God on their behalf, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins. He is able to deal gently with the ignorant and wayward, since he himself is subject to weakness; and because of this he must offer sacrifice for his own sins as well as for those of the people. And one does not presume to take this honor, but takes it only when called by God, just as Aaron was.

So also Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him,

"You are my Son, today I have begotten you"; as he says also in another place,

"You are a priest forever, according to the order of Melchizedek."

In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.

The altar flowers are given to the glory of God by Bob & Heather Heaberlin in celebration of their 3rd wedding anniversary.

Bach Cycle: The French Suite no. 5 by Johann Sebastian Bach (1650–1750) will be presented on the organ as a cycle of service preludes and postludes across three Sundays by Cole Hankins. These seven dances are of various origins - the flowing Allemande ("German" in French), the quick Courante ("current" - actually a corrente in the Italian style), the slow and emotional Sarabande (Spanish, possibly originating in Latin America), the Gavotte and Bourrée (French popular dances), the Loure (a slow jig, inspired by bagpipes from Normandy), and finally a Gigue (essentially the Irish "jig") presented as a fugue in 3 parts. This music is from a period of Bach's career, when his skills as a church composer were underused, and his instrumental writing flourished. Still, Bach frequently signed his works Soli Deo gloria - "Glory to God Alone."



Children & Youth Ministry: Spiritual formation, Godly Play, for our elementary-age children with Elizabeth Pape and Tammy Martin are held at 9:30 am in the children's wing classroom. Adult Formation Hour with Canon John - The Gospel of Mark: Most likely the first of the four gospels in the bible to be written, Mark's account of Jesus' life, ministry, crucifixion, death, and resurrection is the shortest, and yet has a more detailed account of God's good news in Jesus Christ. Mark recounts the story of Jesus in a vivid style, in a rapid succession of incidents. Mark emphasizes Jesus' message regarding the reign of God (kingdom of God) now breaking into human life as Good News. To Mark, Jesus himself is the Good News of God. In Jesus, God is reconciling the world (humanity) to God's self (Mark 10:45).
